Hello and Greetings from Kamwenge, Uganda. I trust that you are well and that the Lord is keeping you.

Gratitude in the midst of lockdowns

We thank God for keeping us in the midst of another COVID Lockdown.

Kamwenge community is largely quiet. The lockdown has meant that many people are confined in their homes. There have been a few Covid 19 deaths largely of those who came from outside the district but the local fatalities are still minimal. It's a tough period nationally

though with a number of prominent people falling to the disease and the healthcare systems becoming overwhelmed.

One of our brethren in PIM, Abraham Ahabwe lost his father mid this June alongside a number of prominent figures nationally and locally. Nonetheless, we're grateful to you brethren whose prayers and support has kept us going. Thanks for having us at heart and for all the support that energises us to make the most of this rather tough time

National Outlook

The cumulative cases through the second wave exceed 80,000 and the deaths are coming to 900. We pray for comfort and healing for all the bereaved families. We pray for healing for those in home and hospital care and even for God's provision and presence because the cost of COVID medication especially in High Dependency units is very high.

Community sensitization on COVID

We are sensitizing the community members through visits to some homes to encourage them to focus their time on agriculture and not loiter in trading centres. Through these visits we distribute masks, soap and some sugar. With decreased commercial activity, there are scarcities in a community that is already desperate with fear, trauma and the pain of loss of loved ones.

We hope to take the sensitization move further and use the local radio; Voice of Kamwenge (VOK) to share messages of encouragement to children and youths in the community to motivate them towards making this break from schools productive and living morally upright lives. We propose to also have talk shows there targeting parents and community members comforting them and motivating them towards productive use of this lockdown time. We hope to run these sensitization programs at least twice a week for the month of July which is entirely under lockdown in Uganda with intense movement restrictions that have strictly confined people to their localities.

Working with teachers/ staff

That aside, we're active with teachers at school involved in several agricultural activities. We have grown vegetables like cabbages, tomatoes, green peppers, onions etc. We are also looking after livestock like cows and pigs on a semi intensive scale and all these are keeping us engaged and productive.



Clare weds




