The KSVS story

The vocational school with a current student population of 500 students has been rolling out market-ready graduates of various vocational disciplines for 15 years now. These were youth who ordinarily would have been lost to drugs and early pregnancies that are prevalent in their community but whose lives have been turned right-side-up by the training and education they get. Now a number our former students are leading in constructing houses and producing the needed furniture products for the local market. The impact is real and there. Glory to God. This is how your support makes a fundamental difference in the lives and communities of Uganda.

Good Shepherd Kidergarten and Primary School

Started in order to give the young stars a good education foundation, this is now an academic giant in Kamwenge and home to over 700 pupils. The community has expressed great interest in the school and although they struggle with means, even here, we see them desiring to afford their children a dependable foundation. And when the children cross into secondary, they are brilliant and more focussed.

Coffee, Cocoa and the environment

We are currently in a big Coffee and Cocoa growing promotion drive in the community because we believe that these are the crops that will help the community to grow and to preserve the environment. There's a nursery for coffee and we'll soon establish that of cocoa. There's a harvest that can bring the family money and yet these are trees that are protecting the environment. The leaves even become a mulch and keep the water in the soil. We have started to train people. Infact our efforts have led to an explosion in growing coffee in Kamwenge. Even banana growing has exploded in recent times (banana being a leading food crop in Uganda). These efforts will help deal with lots

of food and income insecurities in the region. Our long time campaign for the environment has also led to another explosion of growing trees in the area. This is an action against climate change. It is also a tool of economic empowerment and protecting the earth.

Trainings and processing

The school agriculture team is handling trainings for community members. Yohaana, our former student and a graduate from Bishop Stuart is handling these. We have not yet distributed seedlings but we do trainings.

We have raised gardens as demos and they come and participate in weeding and pruning and so learn proper agronomy. In three years, our plan is to put up a processing facility for coffee to add value to their harvest and target the export market.

Other agriculture projects

There are several animal rearing activities, chicken, pigs, goats and cows. They are doing well and it's no longer an idea but these are now in place and they are helping children to learn while also providingthem with food. They also provide manure for growing crops.

Carpentry Workshop and demand

When our carpentry workshop is up and running, we'll be buying people's trees to to make furniture

Keep standing with us in prayer and we are also looking to have we can have more people sponsoring children. Economy is tough. Many want an education and can't afford. We find that we can't afford them. We even got some from Rwamwanja camp. Refugees are from DR Congo and other parts. In just two months of training, we realize that they would have gained skills and good morals.

In fact, the intense work that we have been doing among refugees in Nakilave camp has born great fruit. These refugees have build a big church and around it build service centers which host a clinic, school, recording studios, health centers etc. The impact is great and your labour and partnership with us is never in vain
